

In Memoriam: Andy Neelands 1959-2020

Andrew Peter Neelands grew up on his family's fourth-generation farm in Massie. The youngest of nine siblings, Andy was a natural storyteller with a dry sense of humour. He lived and worked in Alberta for several years, but returned to Massie to stay when his father John passed away. Andy worked on the construction of electrical transformers throughout southern Ontario, but spent much of his free time tinkering with motorcycles and other small engines and riding his favourite motorbikes, street and dirt bikes.

Andy met his one true love, Lorrie Ferguson, and her young daughter Jessica in 1993. Despite his preference for rock bands such as Lynryd Skynyrd, Andy would patiently listen to Lorrie's beloved Country 93's Golden Oldies on Sunday nights and let her teach him how to dance. Andy may have not had a natural sense of rhythm, but he learned to hold his own, leading to the proud moment many years later when he danced with Jessica on her wedding day. When they first met, Andy was like an "annoying, older brother" to Jessica, but they became fast friends and he was especially pleased when she called him Dad. He would pick her up from school and teach her useful life skills such as using the push mower. These lessons would invariably end with them doing something fun such as playing croquet or crokinole.

Like other members of the Neelands family, Andy was interested in politics and would read the newspaper and listen to CBC radio. He especially loved doing the Word Searches. Andy loved his Massie community and would always be the first to help unload the 2,000+ geraniums for the annual Massie Church Geranium Tea and Sale.

The quiet times with Andy are the memories Lorrie treasures most, enjoying a drink on their deck or working on the lawns.
