#### Massie Hall Returns - Outdoors

No doubt we've all been eager to see a return of concerts and other gatherings to Massie Hall. Last year we had only one concert at the outdoor stage briefly known as MOPAC (Massie Outdoor Performing Arts Centre) – where the incomparable Victoria Yeh with her smokin' violin and the ever-popular Drew McIvor performed to an appreciative audience. We had the largest turnout ever for a Massie Hall concert – 83 people.

The continuing uncertainty around the pandemic situation has us feeling a bit tentative, but that's not going to stop us! The Massie Hall board has appointed Massie's own Pete Miller as Artistic Director and we've decided to go ahead with 5 outdoor concerts in 2022.

Pete has lined up some awesome gigs to get our feet tapping and our hearts singing. The kick-off con-

cert in June, called Come Together, will be a tribute to The Beatles by Pete's own band, The Millpond Project, and The Little Bigheads.

Pete, who started playing guitar when he was 12, loves the Grey-Bruce music scene – he's been involved since he moved to Massie many, many moons ago. For six years he was on the board of the Summerfolk Festival, in charge of winter programming. He met Lloyd Mohr at a jam session, the two hit it off and formed a band with the memorable name May Contain Nuts. Massie folks danced exuberantly to their commercially based pop and rock music on New Year's Eve at our community hall.

After a year-long hiatus from performing, Pete and Lloyd returned as a three-piece band with Gerard Willmes, forming The Millpond Project. Lloyd is the lead singer plus he plays electric and acoustic guitars and, occasionally, the drums. Pete provides back-up vocals and the bass accompaniment. Multi-instrumentalist Gerard was the music and math teacher at St. Mary's Catholic School until his recent retirement. He organized concerts and musical plays. Gerard's speciality is keyboards, but for this band he sings and plays drums.

For this special return gig, the trio invited Jeff Freeman, an enthusiastic, self-taught guitarist, to be the lead guitar. Jeff has an interesting connection to Massie: he married Brenda Dutfield who once lived in the house on Massie Road now owned by Carol Mair (next door to Pete's place!).

For the few of you haven't had the pleasure of hearing their music – yet – The Little Bigheads are James Dykeman (vocals, guitar, and on rare occasions harmonica), Lori Mascherin (vocals and percussion) and Enio Mascherin (guitar, background vocals and, rarely, ukulele). Together for over a decade, they have performed at the hall and church in Massie, Harrison Park Restaurant, Coffin Ridge Winery and the Mission Thrift Store employee appreciation day, to name just a few of their gigs.

Many different artists and bands have influenced the trio. James grew up with Cat Stevens, Gordon Lightfoot and Alice Cooper! Lori loves old country like Patsy Cline as well as more recent artists like Linda Rondstadt.

And Enio adores horns such as those heard in music by Chicago or Lighthouse.

When asked about his favourite Beatles' song, James came up with "I Dig a Pony", a little-known piece from the Let It Be album that features tricky guitar work by John Lennon. Unfortunately, it's not a song that adapts well to The Bigheads' style, so we won't be hearing it at the June concert. But there will be some great harmonies and memorable performances from each band and both on stage together!

The ever-popular Massie Fish Fry will also be back, but with take-out only. Vegan options available but must be ordered in advance. Naturally, folks are welcome to bring their lawn chairs or grab a picnic table and eat outdoors on the lawn. Watch for details in your email box.

Pete Miller sees the Come Together concert as a fundraiser for Massie Hall, an opportunity for friends and neighbours to enjoy music and each other's company once more AND a chance for our local musicians to get out there and do what they do so well. "There's no shortage of great musical talent in Grey- Bruce," says Pete. "I wanted to have a concert with people who live a stone's throw from the stage. We should toot our own horn and showcase these talented local folks." And so we will.

In 2009, he received the first Owen Sound Culture Award for his "Outstanding Contribution to Our Musical Community". From 2015 to 2017, he and Rob Rolfe were chosen as Owen Sound's Poets Laureate. Larry and Rob co-wrote, produced and published Late Nights on Irish Mountain, a book/CD project of essays, lyrics and songs. At the beginning of the pandemic lockdown, Larry wrote, produced and published a CD and book entitled These Streets I Know: Life and Music by Larry Jensen, described by the late Andrew Armitage as "one heck of a read".

He would attend church services and Massie Hall gatherings, help with spring clean-up, mow lawns and split wood, and offer wise counsel when needed.

Wayne was a breath of fresh air whenever he blew into town, blasting Elvis Presley on his car radio!

He had a house and later a condo in Oakville – where he could be close to his family and enjoy his delightful grandchildren and great grandchildren – but he spent half his time at Carol's farm revelling in their spectacular view of Massie Pond.

A gentleman and businessman, Wayne believed that getting to know people and treating them with kindness and respect were the keys to success. But there was a goofy side to him as well that treasured friends got to know.

Tom Juffs gave this tribute to his friend's memory, "Wayne had an innate ability to connect with others. His first question would always be about you and it was always sincere and thoughtful. This man who had dined with presidents and prime ministers could always come down to my level, so to speak (he was very tall!), listen and make me feel better about myself and the world around me. His interests and talents were many and could be shared as one would with a father or brother. I believe that Wayne's gift of connection to us is what endeared him to so many. The night before he passed Wayne asked why we would be interested in 'hanging around with us old buggers.' I wish I could ask him the same question."

This warm-hearted man will always be remembered as one of ours.

#### Connie Neelands - 1935 - 2021

She was a lovely lady with an easy laugh – a bright light in our community. She is dearly missed by her family and friends.

their short stature, the two shared a sense of adventure ("Oh, sure, we can do this!") that often ended in hysterical laughter. Like the time... Wendy wanted to put up her Canadian flag at the pond so she called Con to help her. "Little but mighty" Connie readily agreed. Of course, it was a challenging task for the two of them but they finally got the flag up the pole.

As they were walking away, Connie looked back and nudged Wendy. They had raised the flag upside down!

One of nine siblings, Connie was the seamstress in the family, and her sibs, children and grandchildren certainly took advantage of that talent. Her daughter Julie recalls how Connie taught her and her brothers Jon and Joel how to sew on an old treadle machine that their mother had had restored. Julie would make clothing, of course, but the boys sewed GI Joe tents and parachutes. Eventually Connie bought an electric sewing machine, but the antique ("a beautiful piece in a wood cabinet," says Julie) is still in her daughter's possession. And it still works!

In addition to sewing, Con enjoyed gardening and her tulips have become a highlight of spring in our humble hamlet.

Carl and Connie dated in high school, but life took

them in different directions for several decades, until Carl's wife died and Con separated from her husband. In their 50s, they found each other again and the rest is history!

Connie had many severe health challenges over the course of her life but she was "a real trooper", says Wendy. "We were fortunate to have her as long as we did." Our deepest condolences to Carl and the entire family.


